# LORD MAYOR

## **Pikemen and Musketeers Ladies Night Ye Feast**

On 1 October, a full civic party, including the two new Sheriffs, Aldermen Gowman and Lyons, attended the Pikemen and Musketeers Ladies Night Ye Feast at the Honourable Artillery Company (HAC). As governors of the HAC, the Lord Mayor, Major General Chris Ghika and General Sir Patrick Sanders also attended.

## **Lord Mayor and Lord Mayor Elect meet Permanent Secretaries**

The Lord Mayor and Lord Mayor Elect have met several UK Government Permanent Secretaries in the past two months – including from the Foreign, Commonwealth and Development Office, the Department for Culture, Media and Sport, the Ministry of Justice, the Department for International Trade, and the Treasury (second Permanent Secretary) – to discuss the work of the Mayoralty and the Lord Mayor Elect's priorities.

## **Gulf Visit 2 to 11 October**

From 2-11 October, the Lord Mayor visited the Gulf region. Accompanied by the Lord Mayor Elect and Lady Mayoress for part of the programme, the visit's overarching aims were maintaining ties with sovereign wealth authorities in the region, promoting the City as a hub for global investment, and promoting inward investment into the UK in support of the UK Government. A primary focus of the visit was Dubai Expo with the party joining for the climate and biodiversity week, the first of the Expo's 10 themed weeks across a six-month programme. The Lord Mayor took part in the People's Promise and Sustainability for All Majilis panel discussions, both important precursors to COP26. These events gave the Lord Mayor a platform to highlight the COP26 agenda in the Gulf, the City of London Corporation's work in this area, the expertise within the City, and the investment opportunities in this fast growing and developing market across multiple sectors. The Lord Mayor also visited Abu Dhabi, Kuwait and Riyadh where he met Government ministers, representatives of sovereign wealth funds, and key stakeholders from the Financial and Professional Services sector in the Gulf. At various points in the programme, the Lord Mayor was accompanied by representatives from the London Stock Exchange Group who promoted London as a secondary listing partner and opportunities for collaboration.

## **Islamic Finance Event**

The Lord Mayor opened the Islamic Finance Forum 2021 in Mansion House on 12 October. The City Minister, John Glen, delivered the keynote speech at the event. The Lord Mayor noted how the UK offers more Islamic finance services than any other Western country.

## **Canada Visit**

Following his visit to the Gulf, the Lord Mayor visited Canada between 13 and 15 October, with a programme of meetings in both Toronto and Montreal. In doing so he became the first Lord Mayor to visit Quebec in nearly 10 years. Building on successful virtual visits earlier in his Mayoralty, this in-person visit to two key financial services hubs in North America allowed the Lord Mayor to engage with financial institutions, especially those that are significant investors and employers in the City. With COP26 around the corner, the main subject of conversation was the sustainability agenda and how, in a country where several provinces are heavily dependent on the traditional energy sector and where public discourse on climate change is not so developed, Canadian banks can help support the transition towards greener alternatives.

## **Global Investment Summit**

The Lord Mayor hosted the Global Investment Summit Dinner at Guildhall on Monday 18 October, speaking alongside the Chancellor of the Exchequer and the International Trade Secretary. The following day the Lord Mayor attended the Summit and a reception at Windsor Castle hosted by Her Majesty the Queen.

## **Pacific Future Forum**

On 20 October, the Pacific Future Forum chaired by Lord Sedwill, brought together senior diplomatic, military and trade attendees, on board HMS Prince of Wales, to discuss the UK's role and future in the Indo-Pacific region. The Lord Mayor spoke during the trade session, alongside Her Majesty's Trade Commissioner for Asia Pacific, and representatives from the Japanese and New Zealand Governments and from Chatham House. This was originally intended to take place on HMS Queen Elizabeth whilst the Carrier Strike Group was off South Korea in early September, coinciding with the Lord Mayor's international trade visit to the Republic of Korea.

## **G7 Trade Ministers Meeting**

As part of the United Kingdom's ongoing presidency of the G7, a meeting of G7 trade ministers and senior officials took place at Mansion House on 22 October. The meeting was presided over by the new International Trade Secretary, Rt Hon Anne Marie Trevelyan MP. It provided an opportunity for high-level discussions between governments on reforming the multilateral trading system to address 21<sup>st</sup> century trade issues, and advance free and fair trade. The Lord Mayor also welcomed ministers and delegates at a reception at Mansion House the night before the meeting.

# CHAIR OF POLICY & RESOURCES

## Autumn 2021 Party Conferences, 3-5 October

Following on from attending the online Liberal Democrat Conference and the Labour Conference held in Brighton, the Policy Chair and members of the Policy and Resources Committee travelled to Manchester for the Conservative Party Conference. The City Corporation hosted a dinner for MPs, London borough leaders and other policy makers at the Manchester Art Gallery. The City Corporation also hosted a private roundtable with the Centre for Policy Studies on "Financial services of the future: digital, sustainable, open?" with John Glen MP the Economic Secretary to the Treasury and City Minister. A fringe meeting was also held with UK Finance and the UK Onward think tank on "Competitive advantage: how to keep UK financial and professional services firing on all cylinders?" with the Trade Minister Ranil Jayawardena MP.

## Paris meetings and address to the L'AGEFI Global Invest Forum, 5-6 October

The Policy Chair travelled to Paris for a series of in-person meetings with Paris-based policymakers, officials and stakeholders. This was an opportunity to gather feedback and intelligence from EU stakeholders on current EU-UK relations, provide the City Corporation's thoughts on ongoing policy issues, maintain relationships with stakeholders and restate a commitment to working together. The Policy Chair also spoke at the L'AGEFI Global Invest Forum on "Post-Brexit financial services and the issue of equivalence".

## UK Active Conference, 13 October

The City Corporation was once again able to host the annual UK Active Conference at Guildhall. The Policy Chair welcomed the new Secretary of State for Digital, Culture, Media and Sport, Rt Hon. Nadine Dorries MP who was speaking at the conference and briefed her on the City Corporation's sports engagement work.

## Visit to Northern Ireland, 15-18 October

The Policy Chair met political, business, and other stakeholders in Belfast and Derry/Londonderry in order to further the City Corporation's strong ties with the province. Meetings were held at Stormont with the newly elected DUP Leader, Sir Jeffery Donaldson MP, the CEO of Belfast City Council, and business groups.

## Magna Carta Trust and Bingham Centre Civil Justice Seminar - "Build Back Better: Online Civil Justice after the Pandemic", 20 October

Alongside the Master of the Rolls Sir Geoffrey Vos and the President of the Law Society I. Stephanie Boyce, the Policy Chair spoke at this seminar about the acceleration of legal innovation in online civil justice and its future after the pandemic. Hosted at the Guildhall, the event provided an opportunity for the City Corporation to demonstrate its historic support for the rule of law and highlight its work with LawTechUK and through the Lawtech Sounding Board.

## London First borough leader event, 21 October

The Policy Chair spoke at one of the regular London First events for business leaders to hear from senior London government leaders on key issues, focussing on the challenges presented by the pandemic and how we can help the recovery of the City and the wider central activities zone.

## Annual Brussels Reception and meetings with EU stakeholders, 27-28 October

The Chair and Deputy Chair of Policy travelled to Brussels to host the City Corporation's reception for Brussels based stakeholders, and to meet MEPs, Ambassadors to the EU and Brussels based media. The keynote speaker at the reception was the senior MEP Philippe Lamberts, Co-President of the Greens/EFA Group within the European Parliament with whom the Policy Chair was able to have a robust exchange on the value of the financial services sector for transition to net zero.

# PARLIAMENTARY/GLA

## Budget 2021

Chancellor Rishi Sunak presented his 2021 Budget to the House of Commons. Among the headline figures, Sunak announced that the economy is expected to grow by 6% in 2022, and by 2.1%, 1.3% and 1.6% over the next three years. Unemployment, which had previously been forecast as peaking at 12%, is now expected to peak at 5.2%, while underlying debt is forecast to be 85.2% of GDP this year. It will reach 85.4% in 2022-23, before peaking at 85.7% in 2023-24 and then falling to 83.3% three years' later. Government departments are each to receive a rise in overall spending, totalling £150bn over the course of the Parliament, while grant funding to local government will increase by £4.8bn. The NHS will receive £6bn of funding to help tackle backlogs, while the courts, probation and prisons services will receive an extra £2.2bn for the same reason. The Chancellor also announced an increase in the minimum wage to £9.50 and an end to the public sector wage freeze. With regard to businesses, the Chancellor announced that business rates will be more frequently re-valued from 2023, the £1 million annual investment allowance on companies' tax bills will be extended to March 2023, and companies in the retail, hospitality and leisure sectors will be offered a 50% business rates discount worth up to £110,000. The current 8% surcharge on bank profits over £25m will be cut to 3% from April 2023, but with the rise in Corporation Tax, banks will face an overall rate rise from 27% to 28%. Challenger banks will not pay the surcharge until they pass an annual allowance of £100m in profits, up from £25m. In background documents, a seed fund was announced for the new Centre for Finance, Innovation and Technology (CFIT), to tackle barriers to growth and accelerate the UK fintech sector. The establishment of CFIT was a key recommendation of the Kalifa Review. A range of other measures relating to the culture sector, housing and levelling up were also announced.

## Online Safety Bill

Temporary Commander Clinton Blackburn, National Economic Crime Coordinator at the City of London Police, gave evidence to the Joint Committee on the Draft Online Safety Bill, sharing a panel with representatives from the Financial Conduct Authority, the Competition and Markets Authority and the Advertising Standards Authority. Blackburn set out the need to both identify fraud as a priority and include paid-for-advertising in the final version of the Bill. The rise of online fraud as a result of growing internet activity during the pandemic was highlighted, noting increases in online shopping, romance (such as scam dating profiles), and investment frauds. Michael Grenfell, Executive Director for Enforcement at the CMA, argued this rise showed the need for platforms to take greater responsibility for content they host. Asked about police resourcing to tackle economic crime, Blackburn noted that while 40% of all crime was economic, only 1% of police resources was dedicated to that area. The impact of the Bill on police resourcing would depend on the processes it establishes. Other questions to the panel focused on the current legislative framework to tackle online fraud. Mark Steward, Executive Director of Enforcement and Market Oversight at the FCA, noted that while the Financial Services and Markets Act (FSMA) imposed restrictions on advertising financial products that are not FCA registered, this did not prevent the practice from happening on social media. There was also a detailed discussion about the coordination between regulators, with Lord Clement-Jones (Lib Dem) noting his concerns about Ofcom's role as the lead regulator under the Bill, who would not be able to give priority to issues such as those tackled by the CMA. Mr Steward argued that the Bill could complement the FSMA, especially if paid for advertising were included in the Bill's scope.

## COP26

The Commons was united on the need to address climate change in a backbench debate on COP26 but differed in opinion on whether the Government's Net Zero Strategy was the way in which to do this. Green MP Caroline Lucas, who led the debate, was extremely critical of the Government's recently published strategy. She welcomed the ambition of Government targets but did not believe sufficient action was being taken to achieve them. Other, mostly Conservative, members disagreed and gave fulsome praise to the Government's approach. Chair of the APPG on ESG, Alexander Stafford (Con) referenced the finance sector's role in "getting to a low-carbon future." Stafford acknowledged that the "UK is a global leader in finance, but we must also show how our companies need to play their part. We have heard a lot about how the UK and the world can do more, but businesses can also do a lot more." Responding to the debate, Environment Minister Rebecca Pow noted that, at the Global Investment Summit, the Prime Minister announced "18 new trade and investment deals, which will support green growth and create at least another 30,000 new jobs across the UK, thanks to £9.7bn of foreign investment."

## **Bridge House Estates (BHE)**

### **Grants Committee Meeting**

Bridge House Estates held its first Grants Committee meeting in October, (replacing the City Bridge Trust Committee), Chaired by Paul Martinelli, with Dhruv Patel as Deputy. Highlights from the meeting include:

- In response to the Afghan refugees arriving in London, City Bridge Trust is collaborating with the sector to share intelligence and avoid duplication, whilst ensuring it enhances support to newly arrived people. The Trust already funds an extensive network of organisations providing advice and support on issues that will be relevant to new arrivals, including benefits, housing and immigration, as well as supporting migrants and refugees to access mainstream services.
- On 28 July the Chair and Deputy Chair of the Bridge House Estates Board agreed via the urgency process to allocate £485,000 towards the next phase of the LocalMotion funder collaboration (as reported to the BHE Board). LocalMotion is the collective endeavour of six leading UK foundations to significantly impact six local places with funding support (both monetary and otherwise) over 10 years. Funding and decision-making is being co-designed by and with places themselves rather than directed by funders. BHE's contribution is towards the London element of this work (based in Enfield) and a portion of central costs.

### **Freedom of the City for Bharat Mehta**

BHE, with Sheriff Alison Gowman, nominated an anti-poverty campaigner, Bharat Mehta for the Freedom of the City of London at a ceremony on 6 October. Bharat recently stepped down as Chief Executive from the Trust for London charity, which he led for 23 years. Trust for London is an independent charitable foundation which tackles poverty and inequality by funding voluntary and charity groups.

## **Open Spaces**

### **Archaeological excavation**

An archaeological excavation of one of the ramparts on Seven Ways Plain Hillfort at Burnham Beeches is due to take place between 27 October and 2 November after Historic England and Natural England gave consent for the work to be carried out. This will be the second project on the nature reserve in the last two years. It is hoped that the excavation will help improve understanding of how the Hillfort was constructed and what it may have been used for. The work will be live streamed on the project's YouTube channel.

### **Don't pick your own**

An Epping Forest media release reminding people of the byelaw that prevents people from taking fungi from the ancient woodland generated significant interest across the national media and resulted in some excellent TV news coverage. ITV came out to film in the Forest and ran the story on their news bulletins on Monday 11 October. It was a very useful opportunity to remind people of the significance of fungi to the biodiversity of the Forest. It also included coverage of how Epping Forest is home to some rare fungi species and why this is partly responsible for the Site of Scientific Interest and Special Area of Conservation designations the Forest is proud to hold across two-thirds of the site. Other general code of conduct messages were also promoted including encouragement not to litter, not to light fires or use barbecues, and to respect other visitors.

### **Park in the Dark**

Now in its 12<sup>th</sup> year, this ever popular lantern walk through the park is set to be a highlight in the Friends of West Ham Park's calendar. Families meet at South gate, after closing, where children elaborately decorate their torch-like lanterns before setting off for a guided walk through the park to the Bandstand. Here they are met with festive tunes from a local school choir and enjoy mince pies and warm drinks. Park in the Dark is the last in a series of events the Friends of West Ham Park have managed over the year.

Residents will be invited to take part in activities encouraging them to reduce waste and adopt circular economy behaviours. Plans are being finalised, however activities could include making smoothies from fruit which would otherwise be thrown away, bike repair workshops and much more.

### **Christmas Tree from recycled materials being created for Mansion House.**

## **City of London Police Authority Board**

### **Fraud and Cyber Crime**

The tender for the Next Generation Fraud and Cyber Crime Reporting Service continues apace, with the initial invitation to tender having been completed and the successful suppliers being taken to the next round of bids. Meanwhile improvements to the existing Action Fraud service have been made to improve the user experience when reporting a fraud – with an increase in the number of call handlers for telephone reporting and a new chatbot that helps users upload details via the online forms. Action Fraud continues to be a key tool in the fight against fraudsters, providing one of the world's only 24/7 online and telephone fraud reporting services. It also collates information that allows key threats to be identified and targeted campaign messaging to be disseminated to the public and businesses, helping them know how best to protect themselves from the most current scams. The City of London Police Authority continues to work closely with the City of London Police and Association of Police and Crime Commissioners to ensure fraud is made a priority in local areas and that forces across the country have the resources necessary to play their part in the fight against fraud. Only by working together and all playing our part can we effectively tackle this most prevalent of crimes.

They primarily do this through their help-line, 'HOPELINEUK', which provides vital support to those who are going through a difficult period in life. In addition to this, Papyrus seeks to influence national policy, to provide more support, and to reduce young lives being taken through suicide. Over the next year, we will proudly raise as much as we can for this invaluable cause through a combination of non-uniform days, charity events, and most importantly the various fundraising activities that the pupils come up with.

Although Mesopotamian civilisations had assembled texts, the ancient Greeks brought the idea of the universal book collection to its near-legendary summation in the Library of Alexandria, which edited and housed thousands of papyrus rolls on every subject and attracted brilliant scholars from all over the ancient world. But there were many other libraries, serving also as scientific laboratories, public record offices, restaurants, mausoleums and even baths. This illustrated lecture investigates their history and the continuing influence on our modern world.

For the second Annual Alfred Wiener Holocaust Memorial Lecture, Professor Jan Grabowski will discuss how scholars of the Holocaust find themselves confronted with the hostile reactions of various states pursuing the policies of Holocaust distortion. This situation has acquired particular importance and urgency in Poland, where the authorities have introduced a series of measures intended to freeze academic debate, hinder independent research and intimidate scholars whose writings are perceived as opposed to the official, state-approved historical narrative. This lecture is presented by the Holocaust and Genocide Research Partnership between The Wiener Holocaust Library and the Holocaust Research Institute, Royal Holloway.

[The Maths of Beauty and Symmetry](#) - Professor Sarah Hart

**22 November, 1-2pm, at Museum of London or watch online live or later. Ticketed, free.**

People have always found symmetry aesthetically pleasing and examples of it are seen in the earliest art. The Platonic solids have been known to humanity for millennia, some possibly even to Neolithic man, as can be seen in the carved stone balls found by archaeologists. This will look at how we can understand symmetry using mathematics and explore how the rules of symmetry can deepen our appreciation of beautiful works of art and design.

Learn how water technology, sanitation, pasteurisation and animal husbandry can substantially reduce but not eliminate these diseases.

**Shilpa Gupta: Sun at Night**

Opening in The Curve in October, Barbican Art Gallery is presenting the first major London solo exhibition by Mumbai-based artist Shilpa Gupta highlighting the fragility of one's right to expression whilst raising urgent questions of censorship, confinement and resistance. As part of the exhibition, Gupta is presenting and building on her acclaimed project - *For, In Your Tongue, I Cannot Fit (2017-18)* - an immersive installation and soundscape which comprises 100 microphones suspended above 100 metal spikes, each piercing a

page inscribed with a fragmented verse of poetry by a poet incarcerated for their work, writings, or beliefs. Through each poem, Gupta draws attention to the wider stories and experiences of global histories and gives a voice to those who had been silenced.

## **London Metropolitan Archives (LMA)**

### **London: Portrait of a City**

The LMA will be re-opening its onsite exhibition space in Clerkenwell on 8 November with [London: Portrait of a City](#) which runs until 7 April 2022. The exhibition explores the formats chosen by artists and surveyors since the 16<sup>th</sup> century to create their images of the city, from the earliest Victorian daguerreotype photographs to intricate engravings, and elegant watercolours to vibrant aquatints. ### **Positive history: preserving the archives of HIV/AIDS**

Back in May 2020 LMA was delighted to be awarded a substantial grant by the Wellcome Trust for a project entitled Positive history: preserving the archives of HIV/AIDS: care and testimony. Following a delay owing to the pandemic, we are pleased to report that the project got underway in September 2021 with the appointment of the first archivist who will be cataloguing the oral histories filmed by the National HIV Story Trust. A second project archivist will be appointed in 2022 to catalogue the archives of Mildmay Hospital and the charity Positively UK (formerly Positively Women). Together these archives will illuminate two important threads of the AIDS crisis of the 1980s and its aftermath: pioneering medical treatment, care and support; and lived experience of those diagnosed with HIV/AIDS, their carers, partners, relatives and friends.
